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Introduction

Photography is the world's most popular medium for capturing our experiences and what we see. Every day, billions of photos flood the internet, but a true photographer skillfully captures a more informed and intentional vision. Their work involves a creative blend of composition, light, time, sensitivity, and imagination.

The UW Photography Certificate course provides a comprehensive exploration of various technical and creative aspects of this art form. Some students enter the course with prior photography experience, while others are completely new to their cameras. Starting with fundamental concepts in the Fall quarter, students progress to more advanced and experimental work during the Winter quarter. They tackle progressive conceptual and technical assignments, as well as creating a themed photographic project.

The photograph on the right emerged from an assignment that intentionally defocused the subject. Instead, students experimented with form, color, light, and composition, fostering a playful and non-technical creative process. Throughout the course, students also drew inspiration from reading materials, podcasts, videos, and guest photographers who shared their work and answered questions.


In the Spring quarter, each student faced the challenge of proposing and developing a themed six-image series. This provided fresh opportunities for self-expression through photography. The primary requirement was to use the camera, light, and time as tools for inquiry, experimentation, and storytelling through visual language.

This book showcases the resulting projects, demonstrating that students not only met their goals but also grew as creative artists. The collaborative and supportive atmosphere among the students during this process shines through in their vastly diverse ideas and approaches to photography. I take great pride in publishing this collection of their work, and celebrating the certificate in photography they have earned.



Despite centuries of human use, it continues to provide habitat for virtually all the plants and animals that have thrived here for millennia, preserving the cultural heritage of this land.

About this work

I started this project with one main idea: to challenge myself to improve my technical knowledge and practice. I knew nothing about lighting, photographic tools, or composing a full scene, so I decided to focus on learning how to use and manage light—and, at the same time, expand my vocabulary on the subject. The vehicle I used to achieve this was emulating the noir aesthetic because of its particular visuality, which forced me to research and carefully plan my scenes.

About the artist

My first camera was a Zenit 122 that first belonged to my father. I still cherish that piece of equipment turned into a family heirloom that decorates every place I call home. It is a memento of the family who unknowingly cultivated my interest in art. I grew up filling rolls of film with that camera, watching old movies with my mother, reading any fiction I could find within reach, and writing my own stories. 
Princess Louisa Inlet Fjord


Over and above

About this work




My goal was to create abstract photographs, improve my ability to control the result, and produce images that capture the essence of the subject.

About this work

This body of work are six images from my first set of portrait sessions, I chose this project to challenge myself in a genre of photography I haven't done before (portraiture). Three families generously gave their time, opened their homes to me, and allowed me a glimpse into their hearts.

About the artist

Stan is a Bothell, WA-based photographer who loves doing event photography for non-profit organizations. When not capturing images at events, he likes taking pictures of family, architecture, industrial design, historic artifacts, vehicles of all kinds, and is exploring portraiture as a new area of interest. When his camera needs a rest, Stan likes to read, study (he is a lifelong learner), socialize with family and friends, and enjoys traveling.



These are the McKees, a close-knit family. Their artifact of significance is a replica of Excalibur, the sword pulled from the stone by King Arthur, as a nod to their English heritage. It's easy to see they are a stoic bunch; hard to get them to loosen up. They were my first foray into portrait photography. I learned a bunch through the experience of photographing them, which helped inform the later portrait sessions.



This is Al and Jennifer. When posing the parents, asking them to gaze into each other's eyes. The expressions of the couples are all priceless. I think in this sitting, I asked Al and Jennifer to recall the moment they first met.



These are the Hudsons. To help take their minds of the camera in front of them, I asked each one what new thing they learned that week. That question puts your subjects into a different frame of mind, as they fish for something that seems worthwhile sharing. If there is an awkward "I dunno", that is a great response because it elicits a laugh from everyone.



Stephanie and Brandon. Brandon holds a 1940's era camera that belonged to Stephanie's Grandfather, a soldier who served during WW II. Stephanie is a high school photography teacher. Here, I didn't ask them to think of a special moment in their lives— instead, I just waited. Human nature: eventually you snicker and laugh when you gaze into the eyes of the person next to you for an extended period. Or, perhaps I snickered, which elicited their response. Remie, their patient dog, tolerated my intrusion into his life.



The Sporleder family. Their oldest girl (middle) is at the age when cuddling and being affectionate with parents is becoming a thing of the past. Nonetheless, she and her family were very at ease with each other during their sitting and made my job easy. The chairs outside their playhouse have wide armrests, so I asked the oldest girl to sit there, creating a compositional triangle.



Zane and Taylor. Taylor holds her Grandmother's painting. Creativity runs in the family: Taylor is a portrait photographer (I asked her to review my project images) and a potter. Their girls are musicians.

Come Dance with Me


About this work



About this work




Romanticized solitude

About the artist





About the artist





The Art of Everyday Products


About this work

About the artist



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
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
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


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The carved double-headed eagle pole, pictured at night against the Aurora Borealis of May 11, 2024, is to commemorate the Charles Lawrence Memorial Boat Ramp in Suquamish, Washington.

The double-headed eagle symbolizes those who keep watch along the shore, looking for friends or foes. They look side to side so fast, it appears they have two heads. Charles Lawrence (Nigel's grandfather) survived Indian boarding schools, WWII as a US Army soldier, and tuberculosis, to serve as the Suquamish Tribal Council Chairman and fight for (among other things) tribal fishermen to have a place to launch their boats to exercise their treaty rights.

About this Work:

What is “Bulb” - other than what all these photographs have in common? It is a name from the early days of film, when squeezing a rubber bulb attached to a tube fired the shutter. What does the “B” setting do? It keeps the shutter open for as long as the shutter button is depressed. And it can make for magic.

We do not photograph lighting or fireworks. We let them paint themselves on our sensors, leaving the shutter open long enough to record one or a few bolts or bursts.

What else do all of these photographs have in common? Planning. Patience. Perseverance. Power.

I chased the lightning all over Orcas Island for hours before finally getting a few keepers. For the Vancouver, BC fireworks (lower right), we chose Stanley Park for its unobstructed view and much smaller crowds.

The other fireworks images were made on my Vashon Island home. The upper right image is meant to be universal; it makes for good stock and resale potential. The lower left image was planned to give a sense of the unique setting. It is what I scheme about between July 4th shows every year: where to go for the most “Vashon” foreground?

When it comes to your photography, never take your neighborhood for granted. Photo ops abound. And never let your photographs languish. Get them out there. Never stop using them to make a difference, to exercise the Power of photography.

About the Artist:

Ray has worked in photography for over 3 decades - as an educator, stock photography agent, book editor, consultant and photographer - in New York, California and Washington State.

He teaches for colleges throughout the NW, including the University of Washington, Bellevue and Seattle Central. He is also an instructor for artist leagues, art centers, libraries and not-for-profits from botanical gardens to historical associations.

His students range from middle schoolers to retirees. Ray's focus is improving camera skills but especially image design, photo styling and the business of art for all art mediums. A primary objective always is sharing art to make a change, especially to the environment and our impact on it, through increased awareness and inspiration.

About this work

My 2024 photo contribution symbolizes finding new perspectives, playful experimentation and having patience.

As we tend to view the world around us from our standing height, we also tend to shoot from that familiar position.

But when we lower our camera, we can view subjects from more varied angles and create new perspectives. When I photograph, my primary goal is to make images I have not seen before, and to capture familiar subjects in a new way.

When in the Keukenhoff Gardens in Holland, I was floored by the sheer beauty of the gardens, and color groupings that led my eye through the rolling landscape.

I wanted something unusual that is not typically seen, perhaps with a different point of view. Borrowing a step ladder, I started playing with shots from above and from low angles. I had recently discovered the Multiple Exposure settings on my Fujifilm X camera, and decided to try that.

I placed my 10mm lens directly under the Tulip pointing up. I made the first exposure, rotated the camera 180°, aligned the overlaid first frame, and made a second registered exposure. I could not actually see the results in such brightness, so I made over 20 sets of double-exposures.

Once in Lightroom, I chose this frame, added some contrast and was delighted with the results. This photo remains one of my most playfully colorful experiments, and has been a best-seller as licensed stock and as large prints.

About the artist

Dave's artistic career began with a BFA in Communications Design from Pratt Institute in NY. His work has included corporate art direction, graphic design, photography, photo-illustration and assemblage. His images have appeared in public and private collections, and publications including *Nikon World*, *Outside*, *NY Times*, *The Baltimore Sun*, *LA Times*, *National Geographic Traveler*, *Outdoor Photographer*, *Orion*, *PRINT*, *Islands*, *Zoom and Rangefinder*. He has collaborated on eight episodes of "Hit The Streets" and other podcasts and books on the arts.

Since 2001, Dave has instructed photography with the renown Santa Fe Workshops, Maine Media Workshops, Vancouver Photo Workshops, Photographic Center NorthWest, The Anderson Ranch and also at sea with UnCruise. He also leads his own annual cultural travel photography workshops in the US, Mexico, Europe, India, Asia and annually in Cuba since 2015.

Dave has a passion for inspiring and guiding emerging and advanced photographers to understand the nature of light, to discover their unique personal vision and to reach new creative goals.

He is an adjunct instructor at University of Washington and former instructor at Photographic Center Northwest, The Art Institute and Seattle Central College's Creative Academy. Dave consults for product developer including Adobe, Apple, Wacom, Fujifilm, Topaz Labs and Lowepro. He is a member of the Fujifilm X/GFX CREATORS pro photographer team.
